destruction of fish as the result of the Shannon Scheme. The Board had often called attention to this matter, in which 10,000 people engaged in fishing were vitally interested. When this scheme was initiated he attended a meeting at O'Brien's Bridge, at which Most Rev. Dr. Fogarty was also present, and at which President Cosgrave, as he then was, stated that the future of the Shannon fisheries was absolutely safe, that no injury would befall even the humble eel as a result of the scheme. Unfortunately, they were not as strong as they should have been in safe-guarding this great industry. Now they had positive proof that the scheme was causing great destruction amongst fish. The Shannon fisheries were by far the most important inland fishery in Ireland, and the fisheries generally were second in importance only to the land. They saw the agitation that had been raised following the closing down of a tobacco factory. Mr Lemass had stated that power derived from steam turbines was more economical than Shannon power. If it were not for the great amount of money sunk in the scheme the authorities would scrap it. He proposed that a deputa- tion from the Board should wait on the Minister for Local Government when he visited the city, and put the matter before him.

This was adopted, and a deputation of eight members was appointed.
