### DEATH OF MRS GEO. LUTHER.

Numerous friends in Limerick city and county will learn with deep regret of the death of Mrs Luther, widow of the Rev. During her many years residence at Cahirnarry the deceased lady took an active part in the cause of charity, and her bright and courteous disposition made her very popular. He was sure they would forgive him being there in person to take part in which they all had at heart, and which being pushed forward by the Development Association, with the assistance of the Mayor, for the benefit of Limerick and its citizens. If there was anything outside political matters which the President had at heart, it was the question of industrial development. When he entered upon office, they knew what was his object, and that of his colleagues was to establish a better sense of citizenship to make this country industrially prosperous as well as politically free. (Applause.) Assuming leadership of the Government of the country he had done everything to provide industries and employment for the people, in order to make Ireland properly balanced State economically. Now, proceeded Mr. O'Kelly, there had been dependent on other countries for their supplies. Millions of pounds had been spent on goods which could be produced at home. That economic independence was quickly disappearing. Industries were being started all over the country, and it was not the policy of the Government of Valera and his Government to establish these industries in any town, or county. It was their declared policy to provide industries up and down the country so that every area, every town and town might benefit. (Hear, hear.) Limerick was not being forgotten in the furtherance of this policy, and President Valera as a son of this county had that he would do everything in his power to see that Limerick and its county received their due share of the Government's industrial policy. I can assure them of that, as whenever the question of industries was discussed in the Executive Council he always said, "Does Limerick come in in this?"

The Vice President, continuing, desired to thank the Development Association for their address, and to re-assure Limerick was playing in the industrial movement of the country. It was the avowed policy of the Government to manufacture here everything they require.
