

Tributes at Harbour Board.

Alderman P. O'Flynn, at the meeting of the Harbour Board yesterday, proposed a vote of sympathy with the family of the late Mr G. R. Ryan, C.E., who was an esteemed member of the Board, and a highly valued citizen, and who had endeared himself to everyone with whom he came in contact. The death of Mr Ryan had occasioned a great loss to the Board and to the other public bodies with which he was associated. They all deplored his loss, and tendered their sincerest sympathy to his family.

Mr S. J. K. Roycroft, in seconding the resolution, said Mr Ryan was a gentleman of outstanding personality, who took a very active interest in the welfare and development of the city. He was a past President of the Limerick Chamber of Commerce and a past President of the Irish Associated Chambers of Commerce. Mr Ryan's advice and able assistance would be very seriously missed from that and the other Boards with which he was associated.

Mr E. C. Stevenson said that as President of the Chamber of Commerce it was his privilege—one which he valued very highly—to work along with the late Mr Ryan for many years in connection with various Boards in the city. The services which Mr Ryan rendered to the Chamber of Commerce would be referred to elsewhere. No man did more valuable work in the city, and none had a greater sense of civic responsibility.

Mr D. O'Dwyer said Mr Ryan and he did not always agree as to how best the interests of the Board should be served, but he was quite satisfied that Mr Ryan was always very sincere in furthering the welfare of the port and the prosperity of the city. His loss would be very keenly felt by the Board and by the other public bodies with which he was associated. That being so it was only natural that they should deplore his loss, and that their sympathy should go out to his widow and family.

Mr T. J. Loughrey said that he also did not always agree with the late Mr Ryan, but he always regarded him as an excellent citizen whose civic work would ever be regarded as a memorial to him.

Mr P. Doyle associated himself with the expression of condolence. He proposed that the sympathy of the Board should also be extended to the family of the late Mr John Kerr, an ex-Mayor of the city and as such Chairman of that Board at that time.

Mr Moore associated himself with the remarks of the previous speakers in regard to Mr Ryan and Mr Kerr.

The Mayor said the late Mr Ryan always took a very keen interest in the welfare of the city generally. It was his (the Mayor's) privilege to have been associated with Mr Ryan for many years, and he was always impressed by his wisdom and ability. He felt Mr Ryan's loss very keenly, and his sympathy went out to his relatives.

The Mayor added that he also knew the late Mr John Kerr very intimately, and had a great regard for him. As Mayor of the city, and an outstanding public man for many years, Mr Kerr had contributed materially to the welfare of the citizens.

The votes of sympathy were passed in silence, the members standing, and the Board adjourned as a tribute of respect.

Chamber of Commerce.

At a special meeting of the Limerick Chamber of Commerce last evening touching references to the late Mr Ryan were made by the President and other members, and a vote of condolence passed to the widow and relatives of the deceased gentleman.

The Funeral.

The interment of the remains of the late Mr George R. Ryan, C.E., took place in Mount St. Laurence Cemetery this morning, after Requiem High Mass in St. Munchin's Church at half-past ten. On Sunday night the remains were removed from Shamrock-hill to the sacred edifice, where they rested on a catafalque opposite the High Altar.

The Bishop, Most Rev. Dr. Keane, presided at the Mass, the celebrant of which was Rev. Fr. McCarthy, C.O., St. Munchin's; deacon, Rev. Fr. Mortell, C.G., do.; and sub-deacon, Rev. Fr. O'Mara, S.J.

The clergy in the choir were—Right Rev. Monsignor O'Donnell, P.P., V.G., Rathkeale; Very Rev. Canon O'Dwyer, P.P., V.F., St. Munchin's; Very Rev. Canon Curtin, P.P., Croom; Rev. Fr. Wallace, P.P., Cratloe; Rev. Fr. Harty, Adm., St. Michael's; Rev. Fr. Rice, C.C., St. John's, and Rev. Fr. MacNamara, P.P., Patrick's-well.

At the conclusion of the solemn ceremony the coffin was taken to the hearse, and the funeral left for the cemetery. There was a very large attendance of the general public, which included representatives of the Corporation, Chamber of Commerce, Harbour Board, and Trades and Labour Council, as

well as members of the mercantile and business community. It was a striking tribute to the memory of the deceased gentleman, and amply testified to the respect in which he was held in the city.
