## DEATH OF MR GEORGE R. BYAN, C.E.

We record with very sincere regret the death of Mr George R. Ryan, C.E. senior partner of the firm of Messrs J. Ryan and Sons, Builders, Thomas St., which occurred at his residence. Shamrock Ville, North Circular Road, early on Sunday morning. after a protracted illnes. By his demise, a conspicuous figure in public and commercial life has passed from us. The son of the late Mr J. T. Ryan, J.P., of Limerick, and formerly of Waterford, his firm carried out many important contracts in the city and elsewhere. Amongst those may be mentioned the building of St. Joseph's Church, O'Connell Avenue, the reconstruction of the Bank of Ireland, the re-moddelling of the General Fost Office, and the building of large extensions thereto in Henry street several years ago, and more recently the building of a chapel at the Convent of the Good Shepherd, Clare street. Mr. Ryan, who was aged 67, found time to devote considerable attention to civic affairs. He was for many years a member of the Harbour, Board, and took a prominent part in the prolonged discussions on the dock extension and railway schemes, where his views, frank and outspoken as they were, won for him the respect and esteem of the members, including those who differed with him. He was at one time President of the Chamber of Commerce, and a few years ago filled a similar office as President of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of the Irish Free State. The movement of the National Savings Certificates had his earnest support for many years past, and he was Chairman of the Regional Committee for Limerick district up to the time of his A liberal employer, and a kindly and courteous gentleman, his death removes a familiar and popular personality from our midst, and there is deep sympathy with his widow (a daughter of the late Alderman Thomas Gaffney, J.P., of this city), and the family in their sorrow.
