DEATH OF MR. DAVID SHEEHY, EX-M.P.

Mr David Sheehy, ex-M.P., died in
Dublin on Saturday last at the ripe old age
of 90 years. He was a son of Richard
Sheehy, of Broadford, Co. Limerick, and
during the Land League days was a promi-
nent figure in the struggle. He was a
member of Parliament for many years,
having been first elected for South Galway
in 1885, and he retained his seat for South
Meath until 1918, when he passed out with
the Irish Parliamentary Party in the General
Election which returned Sinn Fein to power.
Mr Sheehy visited Limerick on many occa-
sions in old and stirring times, and to the
last displayed remarkable vigour of mind
and body. In social life he was kindly and
courteous, and very highly esteemed by all
who knew him, whatever their political
views. He married, in 1876, Elizabeth,
daughter of Richard McCoy, of Loughill,
Co. Limerick. She died in 1918. He had
six children, all of whom figured promi-
nently in Irish public life. One of his sons
is a Circuit Court Judge.

The funeral of Mr David Sheehy took
place yesterday after Requiem Mass from
the Jesuit Church, Gardiner street, Dublin,
to Glasnevin Cemetery. The Rev John
Neary, S.J., was celebrant of the Mass, at
which, and at the graveside, a large and
representative gathering attended.
