DEATH OF MR. DAVID SHEEHY, EX-M.P.

David Sheehy, ex-M.P., died in Dublin on Saturday last at the ripe old age of 90 years. He was a son of Richard Sheehy, of Broadford, Co. Limerick, and during the Land League days was a prominent figure in the struggle. He was a member of Parliament for many years, having been first elected for South Galway in 1885, and he retained his seat for South Meath until 1918, when he passed out with the Irish Parliamentary Party in the General Election which returned Sinn Fein to power. Mr Sheeby visited Limerick on many occasions in old and stirring times, and to the last displayed remarkable vigour of mind and body. In social life he was kindly and courteous, and very highly esteemed by all who knew him, whatever their political views. He married, in 1876, Elizabeth, daughter of Richard McCoy, of Loughill, Co. Limerick. She died in 1918. He had six children, all of whom figured prominently in Irish public life. One of his sons is a Circuit Court Judge.

The funeral of Mr David Sheeby took place yesterday after Requiem Mass from the Jesuit Church, Gardiner street, Dublin, The Rev John to Glasnevin Cemetery. Neary, S.J.; was celebrant of the Mass, at which, and at the graveside, a large and
