CITY FATAL ACCIDENT.

Mr J. S. McNeice, solicitor, Deputy
Coroner, opened an inquest at the County
Infirmery, yesterday into the circumstances
connected with the death of Edmund Roche
21 years, Upper William street, as the
result of an accident on Wednesday evening,
at the Garryowen Bacon Factory.

Inspector Lyons conducted the enquiry on
behalf of the authorities ; Mr P. G. Collins,
solv., appeared for the next of kin, and Mr
A. Blood-Smyth, solr. for Messrs W. J.
Shaw & Sons.

The Deputy Coroner, at the outset, said
that he intended only to take evidence of
identification and medical evidence, as it
would be necessary to have the attendance
of the Inspector of Factories, who could not
be present until Thursday next, the 29th
inst. He would, accordingly adjourn the
inquest to that date, after medical evidence
had been given.

Mr. Wm. Roche, father of the deceased,
gave evidence of identification. He stated
his son was 20 years, and was a
clerk at Messrs Shaw and Sons' bacon
curing factory. He last saw him alive on
the 20th inst. when he was in his usual good
health. He again saw him in the Infirmery
after the accident, and he was apparently
unconscious.

Dr Annie Murnane, Resident Medical
Officer, County Infirmery, deposed to
examining the deceased after admission to
the Infirmery on the 21st inst. about 2.50
p.m. He had an abrasion on the forehead
and some minor facial injuries. He was
suffering from shock and had a fracture of
the skull. He died at 6 o'clock on Thursday
evening, death being, in her opinion, due to
shock and hæmorrhage, caused by the
injuries received.

The Coroner then adjourned the inquest
for the attendance of the Inspector of
Factories.

Mr Blood-Smyth, solicitor, tendered on
behalf of Messrs. Shaw and Sons deep sym-
pathy with the father and relatives of the
deceased, in which the Deputy Coroner,
Inspector Lyons, and jury joined.
