OBITUARY.

Rev. Father Carroll, Adm.

By the death of the Rev. James Carroll, Adm, St. John's Cathedral, which we regret to record, and which took place at the residence of his father, Mr John Carroll, Ballinanima House, Effin, Kilfinane, on Christmas Day, the Diocese of Limerick loses a prominent and highly respected clergyman. Father Carroll, who was in his fiftieth year, was educated in St. Munchin's Diocesan Seminary, and then went to Maynooth, where, are a distinguished scholastic career, he was ordained in 1902. After a term in the Dunboyne establishment, he returned to the diocese on receiving an appointment on the professorial stall of St. Munchin's College. He was subsequently appointed to a curacy in St. John's, and some fifteen months ago, on the translation of the Rev. Fr. MacNamara to the pastoral charge of Patrickswell, he was made Administrator of the Cathedral Parish. Early this year Fr. Carroll's health became impaired, and he was removed to St. John's Hospital, where he remained for sometime. Thinking that he would benefit by a change he was taken to his home, but the hoped for results not accruing he gradually became worse, and he passed away peacefully, as stated, on Christmas Day. Fr. Carroll was a zealous and exemplary priest, who took a deep interest in the spiritual and temporal welfare of the parishioners of St., John's. He took a keen interest in political affairs since the signing of the Treaty, and was for some years Chairman of the City Central Branch of Cumann na nGaedheal, in which capacity his advice was always helpful and encouraging.

The funeral obsequies took place yesterday in Effin church amid manifestations of deep regret and sympathy. At 11 o'clock, Office and Requiem High Mass, at which the Bishop, Most Rev. Dr. Keane, presided, was sung. The celebrant was Rev. Fr. Rice, C.C., St. John's; deacon, Rev. Fr. Kelly, C.C., do.; sub-deacon, Rev. Fr. O'Grady, C.C., do., and master of ceremonies, Rev. Fr. Brassill, C.C., do. Tho chanters were Rey. Fr. Thornbill, P.P., Mungret, and Rev. Fr. Harty, Adm., St. Michael's, Limerick. There were over one hundred clergy, who included members of the Diocesan Chapter, in the choir.

Amongst the crowded congregation were-Mr W. T. Cosgrave, T.D., ex-President of the Executive Council; the Mayor of Limerick (Ald. P. J. Donnellan) and the Mayoress; Mr G. C. Bennett, T.D.; Alderman J. Reidy, T D.; Colonel Liam Hayes, Dr D. L. Kelly, Inspector Mental Hospitals, and other representative citizens.

The interment took place in the family burial place, Effin, the Bishop officiating at the grave.

Mr. W. J. Holmes, C.E.

The death, which we regretfully announce, took place somewhat unexpectedly at his residence, Fairy Hill, Parteen, on Christmas Day, of Mr William J. Holmes, C.E., at a comparatively early age. The deceased was youngest son of the late Mr Robert Holmes, Athlunkard, and brother of Mr R. Holmes, Athlunkard, and of Dr. P. Holmes, Killaloe. He was for many years a deputy surveyor to the Clare County Council, and a member of the Limerick Board of Fishery Conservators. In the discharge of his official duties he displayed initiative and ability, which won for him the confidence and respect of his employers, and his demise has been learned with deep sorrow in Clare and Limerick, where he was very popular. In social circles Mr Holmes was a welcome companion for his cheery outlook and kindly disposition. The funeral, which took place on Tuesday from Parteen Chures, after Requiem High Mass, to the family vault in Parteen Cemetery, was one of the largest seen in the district for a number of years.

Execution in Dublin To-day.

Patrick McDermott, a young farmer, was executed in Mountjoy Prison, Dublin, to-day, for the murder of his brother John by shooting him outside their home at Ros. moylan, County Roscommon, on September Pierpont, the English executioner, carried out the sentence.

About a hundred people knelt outside the prison, and recited the resary as 8 o'clook approached.

After reading: the execution notice the crowd dispersed.

The condemned man spent the night in prayer, and walked steadily to the scaffold.

It was learned that McDermott ate a good breakfast, and walked steadily to the scaffold. The prison bell was not rung.

The condemned man was attended to by the Prison Chaplain, Very Rev. Canon McMahon, Clonliffe College, assisted by Very Rev. Dr. Dempsey.

LIMERICK FACTORY FATALITY.

Mr J. S. McNeice, solr., Deputy Coroner, and a jury, resumed the inquest at the County Infirmary this evening into the circumstances under which Edmond Roche, aged 20, met his death on the 21st inst. at Garryowen Bacon Factory where he was employed as a junior clerk.

The evidence went to show that deceased, with another official, Mr Joseph Calender, was engaged on the day of the accident superintending the loading of goods for the radio y station down skid. WhenMrCalender left the platform for a few minutes he heard a thud and returning saw that Mr Roche had fallen from the skid to the ground: When picked up he was badly injured and died next morning in the County Infirmary. It was not the duty of anybody to get on to the skid, and there was a notice to that effect on the platform from where the goods were discharged.

The jury returned a verdict of death from shock and hemorrhage as the result of injuries received in the discharge of deceased's duty. They were of opinion that somebody should be in charge of the skid, and recommended the parents to the kind consideration of Messrs. Shaw and Sons.
