Mr. D. Enright.

Numerous friends in the city and county have learned with deep regret of the death of Mr Daniel Enright, formerly buyer of the clothing and tailoring department of Cannock and Company, which took place in St. John's Hospital shortly after midnight on Friday after a brief illness. Mr Enright was a keen business man, ever kindly and courteous, and very popular with the staff and the public. After some forty-five years service with the firm he had been living in retirement in the city for some years past. The funeral took place on Christmas Day at Tarbert, of which place he was a native. It was largely attended, many old friends journeying from Limerick to pay a last mark of respect to his memory.

Mr. J. C. T. Day.

Many old friends in Limerick will regret to learn of the death of Mr John C. T. Day, L.P.S.I. and London, which occurred on Christmas Eve at his residence Glen Holme, Rhyl. Mr Day, who had attained the advanced age of 86 years, was at one time proprietor of the firm of McMahon Day and Co., chemists and druggists, O'Connell street, and for 65 years was engaged in business in this city, which he left some nine years ago with his family to reside at Rhyl, where his son, Dr Cecil Day, has an extensive practice. Mr Day was a highly esteemed and popular citizen, and at one time was a prominent personality in musical circles, being a member of the old Philharmonic Society, which gave brilliant concerts in the Athenaeum. He was a very old member of the congregation of St. Mary's Cathedral, in which venerable pile he took a deep interest, and held the position of Vestry man and other parochial offices. Mr Day's departure from Limerick was much regretted, and deep sympathy will be expressed with his widow, who is a daughter of the late Mr Robert Evans, senior, of this city, and family in their bereavement.

Mr. Patrick Duggan.

The death, which we announce with regret, of Mr Patrick Duggan occurred in the Squith Infirmary, Cork, on St. Stephen's Day, following a prolonged illness. The deceased, who had attained an advanced age, was brother of Mr Tim Duggan, St. Alphonsus Avenue, and before leaving Limerick some years ago to reside with his daughter, Mrs L. Daly, he lived at Ardglass, O'Connell Avenue. He had been employed at Messrs. F. Spaight and Sons, Henry-street, and was a valued official. He was a diamond jubilarian of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family, and a man of high character and probity. His death, in the fulness of years, is a severe blow to his daughter, with whom and the other mem-

FATAL COUNTY LIMERICK ACCIDENT.

An inquest without a jury was held last evening in the County Hospital, Croom, by Dr Cleary, Coroner for East Limerick, touching the death of Cornelius O'Regan, aged 21, of Corkamore, Kilkeedy, who died in the hospital early on Tuesday morning as the result of injuries received the previous day by a fall from a scaffold on which the deceased and two other brothers had been engaged in the construction of a house at Kilkeedy. It was stated in evidence that the scaffold had been erected by the three brothers and two other workmen, who had considerable experience in that kind of work, and that it had been used for some time before the deceased fell. Denis O'Regan, brother, said his explanation of the accident was that the upright on which a plank rested suddenly gave way. Dr Violet Madden, House Surgeon County Hospital, said death was due to shock and hæmorrhage following fracture of the skull and laceration of the brain. A verdict of accidental death was returned, and sympathy with the relatives of the deceased was tendered by the Coroner and Sergeant McKenna on behalf of the Civic Guards.

CHRISTMAS TRADE.

The Christmas trade in Limerick turned out much more satisfactorily than had been expected a week or ten days previously. The shops in all classes of business did a very brisk trade, and on Saturday (Xmas Eve) and long after closing hours the streets were thronged with sightseers. "Would remind you of Dublin," was a common observation to hear as one moved along through the throng.
