DEATH OF MR. CHARLES GOUGH GUBBINS.

We regret to announce the death of Mr Charles Gough Gubbins, fourth son of the late Mr William Gough Gubbins, of Castle-troy, Limerick, which took place on Saturday last at 23 Clyde Road, West Didsbury, Manchester, for which city and district he had for many years, up to the time of his death, been representative of the bacon-curing firm of Messrs. W. J. Shaw and Sons, Ltd., Limerick. He was a brother of Lady Shaw, Colonel Gubbins (Lismullane), and the late Mr Blakeney Gubbins. In his youth the late Mr C. Gubbins was prominently identified with athletics in Limerick and elsewhere. He possessed musical talent of a high order, being a performer on the piano and cornet. He took part in his day in many concerts, charitable and social, in the city, and was very popular. He was well remembered here by the older generation, and the news of his demise will be heard of with sincere regret in city and county. Deep sympathy is extended to his widow, two sons and a daughter, and the other relatives in their bereavement.
