mittee, held Wed.night, Dr Moran, M.O.H., reported one case of influenza-pneumonia, six of scarlatina, fifteen of diphtheria, and one of enteric fever had been notified since last meeting. He recommended a scheme of anti-diphtheria imminution in schools, such as was practiced in several parts of the country. The imminution would be carried out by a series of three innoculations at weekly intervals. The cost of serum per per on would be about Is. 4d, which would mean that a large number of people could be innoculated for the cost of treating one person suffering from aiphtheria. He applied for serum and medical equipment and for permission to obtain the services of a medical assistant in the event of other duties requiring his attention.

The Mayor said he was reluctant to give the scheme any support, as it was not at present known what the scheme was going to cost. As was the case in previous schemes, the contemplated proposal from being a small one might develop into a very large one and add an additional burden to the rates.

Dr Moran said the scheme as proposed by him would cost about £100 per year.

It was decided to adjourn the mitter for further consideration.

DEATH OF MR. T. MORAN.

A well-known and respected citizen, Mr Tim thy Morap, passed away at his residence, Prospect, Taes, evening after an illness of a few weeks duration.
