If they are not prepared to do that, if the position is beyond their capacity, then their obvious duty is to resign and let the city be managed by a person who will be ready to encounter all opposition and give the people what they most need—a reduction in local taxation, or, what is next best, that it will not soar above its present abnormally high figure.
