In reply to Mr Leahy, witness said he was very grateful to Mr Harnett for giving him the house.

Michael Casey said his mother was a tenant of the house in question in 1914 at a weekly rent of 2s 6d, which was later increased to 3s.

Defendant said when he purchased the house in 1914 he had to expend about £130 in putting it into a proper state of repair. Mrs Casey, a former tenant of the house, paid a rent of 3s 6d per week, and witness paid the rates for her, as she was unable to do so herself.

The Justice fixed a standard rent of 4s per week and allowed £1 1s expenses.

### CO. LIMERICK FARMER'S WILL.

In an action in which Rev. J. Murphy, C.C., Bansha, was plaintiff, and sought as executor to establish the will of his brother, Thos. Murphy, farmer, Lodge, Hospital, and defendant was Mrs E. Campion, Lodge (sister of testator), who opposed the will on the usual statutory grounds, Mr Justice Hanna admitted the will to probate, and allowed plaintiff costs as executor. There was no appearance for defendant. The estate is worth £4,400.

Evidence of testamentary capacity of deceased was given by Mr T. Walshe (managing clerk to Mr Power, solicitor), who took the instructions for the will; Mr T. Mitchell, farmer, Lodge; and plaintiff, who said testator told him of the contents of the will a fortnight after it was made. He saw testator a week before he died, and he was then, as always, quite competent.

### F.F. Procession.
