

SEQUEL TO ROAD ACCIDENT.

Michael O'Keeffe was charged and pleaded not guilty to causing grievous bodily harm to Thomas McAuliffe by knocking him down with a motor car on the 8th February, 1932.

Mr G. Kenny (instructed by Mr J. P. Lavan, solr.) defended.

Mr O'Donnell briefly outlined the case for the prosecution, and said the accused was driving a motor on the night in question to a dance hall. On the way he drove into a cyclist, Thomas McAuliffe, and seriously injured him. The prosecution held that at the time the accused was driving in a negligent and careless manner.

After evidence the jury disagreed, and accused was put back to next Circuit Court.

DEATH OF MRS J. HARTIGAN.

The death, which we announce with regret, took place at Silverspring, Sandycove, Co. Dublin, on Tuesday night, of Mrs Jane Hartigan. The deceased lady, who had reached an advanced age, had been ailing for a considerable past. She was widow of Dr J. T. Hartigan, Tar Brook, Croom, who was medical officer of Croom Workhouse for a number of years, and mother of Mr Martin Hartigan, the well-known Oghbourne race horse trainer. Three other sons—Dr. J. T. Hartigan, Rev. A. Hartigan, S.J., and Mr P. Hartigan, all now deceased—served in the Great War. Mrs Hartigan resided in Sandycove during the past ten years, and was held in the greatest respect by all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance, and sympathy will be extended to her family in their bereavement. The interment will take place after Requiem High Mass at 11 o'clock to-morrow in Croom Parish Church.
