SEQUEL TO ROAD ACCIDENT.

Michael O'Keeffe was charged and pleaded not guilty to causing grievous bodily harm to Thomas McAuliffe by kaocking him down with a motor car on the 8th February, 1932.

Mr G. Kenny (instructed by Mr J. P. Lavan, solr.) defended.

Mr O'Donnell briefly outlined the case for the prosecution, and said the accused was driving a motor on the night in question to a dance hall. On the way he drove into a cyclist, Thomas McAuliffe, and seriously injured him. The prosecution held that at the time the accused was driving in a negligent and careless manner.

After evidence the jury disagreed, and accused was put back to next Circuit Court.
