

## NEWS TO LOCAL BODIES IN JUNE.

A letter has been sent to all local authorities by the Secretary of the Department of Local Government and Public Health, intimating that the Minister of Public Health has decided to hold elections of all local authorities during the month of June.

The Eucharistic Congress held in Dublin in June, these elections were postponed by the Local Elections and Meetings (Amendment) Act, 1931.

The Minister's letter further states that the Government will be prepared to consider amendments to the Local Government Act, 1925, as to the date to hold the Local Government Elections. This date must not be later than June 23, nor later than July 1, 1933.

The Act did not apply to the elections of County Boroughs, and accordingly the elections in the County Boroughs of Limerick and Waterford will be held until 1934. In the Dublin County Boroughs, however, the elections will take place this year at a date to be determined by the Councils of those boroughs.

The Act applies to every other local authority, including those local authorities which have been dissolved and whose powers and duties are exercised at the discretion of the Commissioners appointed for that purpose.

## A PRIVATE STILL.

A fine of £350 were imposed on a man, wine and spirit dealer, of Sheffield, at Sheffield police court yesterday for offences against the Spirits Act. He was also fined £27 costs.

The man alleged that Grossman had a still in his garden at his home in Sheffield, and used it for distilling spirits.

## COUNTY COUNCIL.

A meeting of the County Council is convened for Saturday next at 11 o'clock to consider a short agenda. The most important business to be transacted is to consider tenders for the rate apportionment, and a letter from the Co. Health Board in reference to the concreting of the streets of Kilmallock in addition, and three notices of motion, one being to award a pension of £38 15s per annum to Mr E. Duggan, retired rate collector.

## CIVIL SERVICE GUILD.

The report of the executive committee of the Civil Service Guild for the year ended December 31, 1932, shows that the membership is 7,785. Subscriptions and investment income for the year amounted to £411, and expenditure to £394. Investments of the guild comprise £650 Free State 5 p.c. Loan and 375 Saving Certificates.
