LAND ANNUITIES REDUCTION

De-Rating to be Abandoned.

Replying to Mr T. J. O'Donovan (Centre
Party, Cork, W.) in the Dail yesterday, Mr
De Valera said that the policy of the
Government in connection with the de-
rating of agricultural land was announced
in the House last November. It was not
proposed to increase the amount available
for de-rating, as the Government proposed
to reduce by one-half all land purchase
annuities. This would cost the State con-
siderably more, and would be a great ad-
vantage to the agricultural population.

Mr O'Donovan—Has de-rating been
definitely abandoned?

Mr De Valera—We have definitely
changed from de-rating to the remission of
one-half of the land annuities.

SUDDEN DEATH.

Labourer's Street Collapse.
