and anxiety the Free State Budget, which is to be introduced to-morrow in the Dail by Mr MacEntee, Minister for Finance. The Political Correspondent of the "Irish Press" writes to-day that he is informed the Minister "will have a more cheerful account to give of the finances of the State than critics have been leading the country to expect. Contrary to general beliefs, there will be no spectacular changes in taxation, I was assured last night, so that statements purporting to give forecasts of drastic changes can be discounted. There will be 'some slight adjustments' in the incidence of taxation, but it is expected that income tax will remain at the same rate. Any rebate in the duties on alcoholic beverages would cause surprise in well-informed quarters."

The Minister will also possibly refer to the new loan which the Government proposes to float as soon as possible after the Budget to carry out big development schemes.

SHANNON DROWNING MYSTERY.

The body of an unknown man was recovered from the Shannon at Coonagh this morning. It was in an advanced state of decomposition, and is believed to have been a considerable time in the water. There has been no report of any person missing in Limerick or district, and the remains were removed by the Corporation Fire Brigade ambulance to the City Home morgue pending an inquest.
