LATE MRS STACPOOLE KENNY.

We regret to record the death of Mrs
Louise Mary Stacpoole Kenny, widow of Mr
Thomas H. Kenny, a prominent Limerick
Solicitor in his day, which occurred at her
residence, Donore, Bray, on the 9th inst.
She was a daughter of the late James R.
Dunne, M.D., J.P., of Morrinstown, County
Kildare, and grand-daughter of Matthias
Stacpoole, of Moymore House, Lahinch,
County Clare, where she was born. Mrs
Kenny, who was very highly esteemed
by friends in Limerick, where she resided
for very many years, was a lady of high
literary attainments, and the author of
several well-known novels and biographies,
in which her very refined style and artistic
skill were fully evident. Her works, some
of which were picturesque and very descrip-
tive of social life in Clare, included "St.
Charles Borromeo" (which received the
Apostolic Benediction of Pope Pius X.),
"St. Francis de Salus," "Jacquetta,"
"Carrow of Carrowduff," "At the Court of
Il Moro," "Our Own Country," and many
others, and she also wrote articles on Irish
life for the American magazines. Most of
these products from her facile pen were
published many years ago.

The funeral took place yesterday morning
from the late residence of the deceased lady
to St. Peter's Church.
