NEWCASTLE WEST LOW RATE.

At the meeting of Newcastle West Town Commissioners, Mr Sean Brouder, Co.C. (Chairman), presiding.

The Town Clerk submitted his annual estimate for the year 1933-34. As a result of the income derived from the tolls and markets, a sum of £79 would pay the outgoings of the Commissioners.

The Chairman said that was very satisfactory. The meaning of the Town Clerk's estimate was that half the rate they struck last year would meet their expenditure. In other words they could reduce the town rate from 1s. in the £ to 6d in the £—he supposed the smallest rate in Ireland.

Mr Clifford—That is very satisfactory.

On the motion of Mr Clifford, seconded by Mr Culhane, a rate of 6d in the £ was adopted.
