In reply to Mr Keyes, the Inspector, the maximum number of houses per was 25, but it depended on the area which they were built. In the original Island Field scheme the development per house was £75, but in the pre scheme if adopted the costs would be n smaller.

In reply to Ald. Reidy, Mr Stenson that the acreage on the Island Field suit
