## OBITUARY.

### Mr. James Carr.

We regret to record the death of Mr James Carr, Superintendent of the Limerick Corporation Waterworks Department, which occurred yesterday morning in Richmond Hospital, Dublin. For many years he was prominently identified with the Labour movement in this city, and in his time filled, respectively, the offices of President, Secretary, and Treasurer, of the Limerick Trades Council, and up to the time of his demise was President of the local branch of the Irish Labour Party. He was also a member of the National Executive of the Irish Trades Union Congress, and one of the pioneers of the Limerick Conciliation Board and the Limerick Branch of the Irish Distributive Workers' Union. He was a man of broad ideas and of a most kindly and charitable disposition. He had been Water Superintendent for many years, and proved himself a most efficient and courteous officer. For some time past he had been in delicate health. Deep sympathy is extended to his widow and relatives.

The remains arrived last evening at about 9.15 by motor hearse from Dublin, and were met by a large concourse of people, representing the various trades union bodies in the city. The Mayor (Mr P. F. Quinlan, B.C.), the ex-Mayor (Ald. Donnellan), and several other members of the Corporation and the officers were present. The remains were removed to St. John's Cathedral, whence the funeral will take place tomorrow at 3 p.m. to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery.

### Mr F. C. Hartigan, B.E.

A prominent and popular County Limerick man, Mr F. C. Hartigan, B.E., Rathkeale, died in St. John's Hospital, Limerick, in the early hours of Thursday morning at the age of 70. He was for many years Engineer of the old Rathkeale District Council and Board of Guardians, and an Assistant County Surveyor. He was a noted Irish scholar, and contributed many articles and letters to the Press in his time. To his bereaved widow; his brother, Mr P. Hartigan, Clonagh House, and other relatives widespread sympathy is tendered in their bereavement.

The funeral, which was very largely attended, took place yesterday from St. Mary's Catholic Church, Rathkeale, to the family burial place at Clonagh.
