DEATH OF MISS EILEEN O'BRIEN.

News of the death of Miss Eileen O'Brien, Convent Street, which occurred yesterday at Milford House, was heard with deep regret by a large circle of friends in the city.

As cashier at the Athenæum for many years the late Miss O'Brien had made many friends, and by her sterling character, allied to a kindly disposition, had gained the respect and admiration of all who knew her.

It speaks volumes for the late Miss O'Brien that amongst no section in the city was she more popular than amongst the people of Cecil Street, where she had been engaged for a very considerable time. Her remains were removed from Milford House to St. Mary's Parish Church this evening.

The funeral will take place to-morrow morning from St. Mary's Parish Church, following Solemn High Mass at 10.30 a.m., to Mount St. Laurence Cemetery.

RUSKIN'S LETTERS.

A presentation copy of the life of Dr Johnson, by Boswell, and inscribed by him in 1793, was sold for £220 at Sotheby's this week. Ruskin's unpublished correspondence to his mother from 1853 to 1871 realised £220. There were 395 letters. Points from the letters include descriptions of France. Ruskin gave his mother directions not to furnish Denmark Hill like Buckingham Palace.

BRITISH APPLE CROP ESTIMATES.

Inspectors of the British Ministry of Agriculture have furnished estimates of the probable yield of apples. Although there are variations in different areas the yield will apparently be somewhat lower than in 1932.

The death has occurred at Ballinglanna, Clonakilty, of Mrs Julia Burke, at the age of 101 years.
