KILKEE DROWNING.

Young Student Loses His Life.

Monday—A sad drowning fatality occurred today at Kilkee when a party of men went for a bathe at Newfoundland. They had been warned by the Town Council not to bathe owing to the rough weather. Two of the party were seen in difficulties, and a fisherman named James Foran, who had been an onlooker, made a perilous descent down the side of a cliff about 50 feet high. He threw a lifebuoy to James Furnell, a member of a well-known Co. Limerick who, fortunately, was rescued by another of the party, a young student of the first Military College, named Basil Foran, 21, of 1, Glandwin Terrace Road, Cardiff, Wales, was drowned, in spite of the endeavours of James Furnell to save him. He was taken ashore in an exhausted condition.

This is the first drowning that has occurred at Kilkee since 1924. A canoe was used by James Foran fought the heavy sea in a unsuccessful attempt to save the young man. His body has not yet been found.

CHILD'S DEATH FROM SCALDS

Mr J. S. MacNeice, City Coroner, held an inquest at Barrington's Hospital last evening touching the circumstances of the death of Margaret Daly, aged 5½ years, living at 116 Carey's road, who died on Sunday as a result of injuries received on the 8th inst. from scalds.

Sergeant Ruane conducted the enquiry. Mrs Margaret Daly, mother of deceased, stated that on the morning of the 8th August she was washing clothes in the kitchen of her house. At 8 a.m. she had a pot of clothes boiling on a gas ring. The deceased came from her bedroom, and she (witness) put her sitting on a chair near the fire and gave her some milk. Witness then went into the yard and was away about a minute when she heard screams coming from the kitchen. She ran in and saw her daughter lying on her side on top of the pot of clothes which was then on the ground. She immediately removed her and rubbed olive oil to her side. After a few minutes she had her removed to Barrington's Hospital. There was nobody in the kitchen at the time of the occurrence, as her other four children were in bed. Deceased died on the 20th inst.

Dr James Roberts gave evidence of attending the child. Death in his opinion was caused by pneumonia, due to burns received.

The Coroner returned a verdict in accordance with the medical testimony, that death was caused by burns accidentally received.
