## LIMERICK MAN'S DEATH IN SOUTH AFRICA.

The death took place on the 6th ult. of Captain Charles E. King, in Tanganyika, East Africa, after a rather brief illness. The deceased, who was a native of Limerick, served in Thorneycroft's Mounted Infantry in the South African War, and in the King's African Rifles from 1914 to 1918. At the conclusion of the World War he took up prospecting in East Africa, and his death, which was due to black water fever, occurred in his camp. In his final illness he was attended by Mr H. D. A. Bannerman, a neighbouring prospector and personal friend, by the mission physician, a nurse, and Pastor M. L. Melander, B.D. The interment was in the Lutheran Mission Station, Rusuma.
