Dr. John Wallis, dispensary medical officer, Charleville, had a miraculous escape on Sunday last when returning home after a visit to friends of his in the Kilfinane district.

Between Kilmallock and Kilfinane the steering gear of the motor car which he was driving gave way. The car, it appears, swerved and the rear portion struck the roadside fence, as a result of which Dr. Wallis was precipitated on to the road. He sustained some nasty injuries and was dazed for a considerable time. He was subsequently brought to his residence at Charleville and attended by Surgeon O'Connor, Croon County Hospital, and Dr. Kearney, of Cork, who treated him for his injuries, which, fortunately, were not of a very serious nature.

DEATH OF DR. E. T. KING.

The death took place in the Meath Hospital, Dublin, to-day, of Dr E. T. King, eldest son of Mr John King, O'Connell Avenue, Limerick. The deceased, who was in his fortieth year, had only been ailing three weeks, and his death has come as a shock to numerous friends in the city, who were unaware of his indisposition. Dr. King was during the past fifteen years Medical Officer of Foxrock, Co. Dublin, dispensary district. He received his early education at the Sacred Heart College, from which he went to Mungret College, and then to the National University, where he graduated. He was brother-in-law of Dr C. Molony, Assistant Resident Medical Superintendent Limerick Mental Hospital, and leaves a widow and family to mourn his loss.
