LIMERICK MAN'S DEATH IN CHICAGO

The death has taken place at his residence,
Greenview, Chicago, of Mr Patrick J.
O'Keeffe, after an illness of two years'
duration. The deceased was a son of the
late Mr Denis O'Keeffe, 17 Ascot Terrace,
who was for a long number of years in the
Limerick Postal Telegraph staff of the
General Post Office. Mr Patrick O'Keeffe
emigrated to the United States in Septem-
ber, 1910, and carried on a successful
business in Chicago up to the time of his
death. He is survived by his widow and
six sons, and is buried in All Saints' cemetery
next to his brother, Mr Peter J. O'Keeffe,
who passed away eighteen months ago.

VACANT CORPORATION POSITION.
