Mr. T. Dundon.

Following an illness of some duration, the death occurred at his residence, Barnakyle, Patrickswell, on Thursday, of Mr Thomas Dundon, at an advanced age. The deceased, who was an extensive agriculturist, was father of Dr. W. P. Dundon and Mr J. J. Dundon, M.R.C.V.S., Chief Veterinary Inspector to the Corporation. He took a prominent part in the Nationalist movement, and was a member of the old Limerick No 1 District Council and Board of Guardians. Mr Dundon was a man of engaging disposition, and his demise will be learned with regret by a wide circle of friends, who will extend sympathy to his family in their bereavement.

The death took place at the City Home and Hospital yesterday of Mr Daniel Hannon at a fairly advanced age. The deceased was for a long number of years connected with the commercial life of the city as manager of the seeds and implement departments of Messrs J. P. Evans & Co., Sarsfield street and Thomas street. He was one of the oldest members of St. Michael's Temperance Society, of which he was secretary for some years, and a close friend of the late Bishop, Most Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer, founder of the Society. Mr Hannon was a Golden Jubilarian of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family, and as a nationalist of the old school of politics he played a prominent part in the elections which took place in the city since the leadership of Parnell.
