Motor Accident Near Tarbert.

Limerick Man Succumbs to Injuries.

Information of a very sad motor accident, which resulted in one death, reached Limerick yesterday afternoon. The crash took place on Sunday night at Parmon Cross, three miles on the Listowel side of Tarbert.

Mr Peter Stenstrom, a Swede, who lost his life in the accident, was resident in Limerick for some years past, and carried on the business of dairy engineer. The other occupants of the car, Mr Herbert Graham, also from Limerick, and Dr. Moy-nihan, North Kerry, escaped with minor injuries.

It appears that they were motoring from Tarbert to Listowel at 11 o'clock p.m., with Mr Stenstrom driving. Coming to Parmon Cross, at which there is a sharp bend, the steering gear of the car got out of order and the deceased lost control. The car mounted the ditch, and the occupants were pitched on to the road.

When picked up Mr Stenstrom was unconscious. He was conveyed in a passing motor car to Listowel District Hospital, where he died at noon yesterday.

The sad news was heard of with deep regret in Limerick by a wide circle of friends of Mr Stenstrom, who was very popular, and to his bereaved widow and family the deepest sympathy is extended in their tragic sorrow.

Inquest Opened and Adjourned on Charge of Manslaughter.

A message from Listowel this evening states:—

An inquest was opened in the District Hospital, Listowel, to-day into the circumstances under which deceased met his death.

The proceedings were conducted by Dr. Clancy, Coroner, North Kerry, and a jury.

Inspector J. Ryan, Listowel, appeared for the Civic Guard authorities.

Evidence of identification was given by Herbert Graham, Limerick, one of the occupants of the motor car.

The medical testimony was given by Dr Dillon and Dr McGuire, Listowel, who held a post mortem examination on the body. They stated that death was due to hæmorrhage of the brain, as a result of severe violence; they were of the opinion that the deceased could not have survived longer than twenty-four hours after receiving the injury which caused death.

At this stage, Inspector Ryan applied for an adjournment of the enquiry in view of pending criminal proceedings.

The application was granted, and subsequently Inspector Ryan effected an arrest on, it is understood, a charge of manslaughter.

VALUATION OFFICIAL'S SUDDEN DEATH.

The Inquest.

Mr J. S. MacNeice, solr., Deputy Coroner, held an inquest at Barrington's Hospital yesterday into the circumstances of the death of Wm. H. Hutchison, Dublin Road, Sutton, Co. Dublin, who died suddenly at the Hotel Desmond, Catherine street, on Saturday afternoon last.

Sergeant McFaul conducted the enquiry; and Mr R. O'Sullivan, solr., represented the widow of deceased.

John McMillian, Glandine Baley, County Dublin, District Valuer in the General Valuation Department, Dublin, gave evidence of seeing the body of deceased at Barrington's Hospital. He identified it as that of his companion, Wm. Hutchison. The deceased was a district valuer, aged about 51 years.

Dr W. P. Dundon, stated that he saw the body of deceased at the Hotel Desmond on Saturday afternoon. With the assistance of Dr T. Morris he performed a post mortem examination, and they found that deceased suffered from valvular disease of the heart, marked dilation of the stomach, and gall stones. Death, in his opinion, was due to heart failure, caused by valvular disease of the heart.

Dr T. Morris, R.M.S., Barrington's Hospital, gave corroborative evidence.

Eoin Brochain, Howth, Co. Dublin, valuer, said he was present in the Hotel Desmond on Saturday last with the deceased at about 2 p.m. Deceased complained of severe pain in his chest and retired to his bedroom. Witness went to the bedroom in about 5 minutes and found deceased suffering great pain, and told witness to get a capsule from his bag. As deceased appeared to get worse witness called in a doctor to attend him, and remained with him until the doctor came. Life was extinct when Dr Dundon arrived. Witness was an assistant to deceased, and never knew him to get a similar pain before. He appeared to be in his usual good health during the week.

The Deputy Coroner recorded a verdict in accordance with the medical testimony, and expressed sympathy with the widow and family, in which Sergeant T McFaul joined.

On behalf of the widow Mr McMillian thanked the Coroner and the Civic Guards for their expressions of sympathy and kindness.

Another Sudden Death.

William O'Donnell, aged 55, residing in Parnell street, died suddenly at his residence on Saturday evening. He was after returning from work in the city when he had a seizure. A medical certificate showed that death was due to heart failure, and the Coroner did not deem it necessary to hold an inquest.
