The special preacher, morning and evening, was the Rev. Canon Baillie, M.A., Rector of Carrickmines, who, in the course of earnest and impressive addresses, spoke of the world conditions of to day, and the great and expanding work of foreign missions.

The offertories were on behalf of the Church Missionary Society.

DEATH OF AN EX-RUGBY PLAYER.

The death took place at the County Infirmary, yesterday, after a brief illness, of Mr Jeremiah O'Brien at a comparatively early age.
