VERSICIF

DEATH OF MR. J. S. GAFFNEY, SOLICITOR.

We announce with deep regret the death of Mr. J. S. Gaffney, solicitor, which took place at an early hour this morning at his residence, 86 O'Connell street, Limerick. The deceased gentleman had been seriously indisposed during the past month, and this week his condition became extremely critical, no hope being entertained for his recovery.

Mr Gaffney, who was 67 years of age, was third son of the late Alderman Thomas Gaffney, J.P., and brother of Mr Thomas St. John Gaffney, who was United States Consul-General at Munich when the European War broke out. He received his early education at the Sacred Heart College, the Crescent, after which he went to Tullabeg College, where he had a brilliant course. He was a graduate of the old Royal University, and all during life he was a keen student of literature, in which he showed a remarkably discriminating taste. He was articled to the late Mr Patrick Shelton Connolly, solicitor, of this city, and admitted a solicitor in the Michaelmas term of 1891. On the death of Mr Connolly in 1894 Mr Gaffney took over that gentleman's extensive practice, and his aptitude and tireless energy were demonstrated in the demand for his professional services in the city and county. His professional activities did not prevent him taking part in civic affairs, in which he was keenly interested. He was a member of the Corporation for a period, where he served with his father and brother, the late Mr Joseph P. Gaffney, who was High Sheriff for the city in 1897. As a Corporator, he showed initiative and industry, coupled with a desire to advance the welfare of the people. He was a ready and keen debater, and above everything else Mr Gaffney loved the city of his birth, its history and traditions. In the Courts he was at his best as an outstanding advocate. On the death of Mr William Leahy he was appointed Crown Solicitor for the City and County, and in that capacity he discharged his duties with a fairness and impartiality that were recognised by the Bench and public. When the British regime came to an end his tenure of that office closed, and he devoted himself with renewed effort to his private practice. Mr Gaffney was Chairman of the Limerick Bar Association up to recently, and was an enthusiastic member of the Rotary Club, of which he was a past President. He was also a past Chairman of the Thomond Archaeological Society and Field Club, and a patron of the drama and of music.

He was a Fellow of the Royal Society of Antiquarians, a life governor of Barrington's Hospital, and a member of the Rule-making Committee of the District Court rules.

In his early days he took part in the entertainments promoted by the Limerick Operatic Society, being the possessor of a fine voice and a fine stage appearance. He took an interest in sport, especially rowing and Rugby football. He was an old member of the Limerick Boat Club, and a member of the Garryowen Football Club. He travelled extensively on the Continent and in America, and being of an observant turn of mind, he profited by the experiences acquired, and related them with a facility which impressed his hearers.

In the death of Mr Gaffney a prominent and interesting figure passes out of the life of Limerick, and one that will be missed for his sterling qualities, happy disposition, and engaging companionship. He was married to Miss Spain, daughter of the late Mr Michael Spain, O'Connell Avenue, one of the founders of the well-known firm of Lynch and Spain, provision merchants, Roche's street, and a prominent sportsman in his day.

Mr Gaffney's death comes as a severe blow to his widow and family, to whom sincere sympathy will be extended in their bereavement.

The remains will be removed to St. Michael's Church at 8 o'clock to-morrow (Sunday) evening, and the funeral will take place after Requiem Mass at 10.30 o'clock on Monday morning, for Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery.
