

Germany's Withdrawal

Only Way Left to Her
Says Bishop of Ripon.
The Bishop of Ripon, Dr Burroughes speaking at Ripon Diocesan Conference today, said the withdrawal of Germany from the Disarmament Conference and the League was the only way left to her to make the world take her seriously.

Rescued by Breches Buoy.
Eleven men were today rescued by a breches buoy when the Norwegian steamer Graner, thirteen hundred tons, bound from Finland to Forth, with timber, ran ashore in Cawston Bay, near Sponehaven, on the Kincaidineshire coast last night. The captain and six members of the crew remained on board. This life-saving brigade are standing by.

Island Field Housing.
The Corporation will have under consideration at a meeting of the Whole House Committee to-morrow night the question of tenders-received for the development work on the Island Field housing scheme. When a contract has been declared, it is to be hoped that no undue delay will occur on the part of the Department of Local Government in giving sanction to the acceptance of the tender, so that the work can be proceeded with next month. Work of this character, which comprises the making of roads, construction of sewers, and the laying down of gas and water services, would absorb a large number of men who are now on the unemployed lists drawing home assistance from the rates.

Death of Mrs K. Killeen.
The death, which we announced with regret, took place at King's College Hospital, London, on Sunday of Mrs Kate Killeen, after a protracted illness. The deceased was widow of Mr James F. Killeen, Canal House, Limerick, a former official of the Board of Works. She was a lady of great charm of manner, which endeared her to a wide circle of friends in the city, who deeply regret her passing, and extend sympathy to her son, Mr A. Killeen, C.E., and daughter, Mrs Joseph J. McCarthy, Auburn Villas, O'Connell Avenue, in their bereavement.

The remains of the late Mr J. S. Gaffney, Solicitor, were removed on Sunday evening at 8 o'clock from 86 O'Connell street to St. Michael's Church, where they rested overnight. Yesterday morning at 10.30 o'clock Requiem Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Father Hart, Adm., for the repose of the soul of the deceased, after which the funeral left for Mount St. Laurence Cemetery.

It was a remarkable tribute to the memory of a gentleman who occupied a prominent position in the life of the community with which he was professionally associated for over forty years. Harbour Board

The Rates Bill.
Mr S. J. K. Roycroft presided at a meeting of the Limerick Harbour Board yesterday. There were also present—Messrs T. J. Loughrey, P. Moore, B.C., M. McMahon, E. Stevenson, Alderman T. J. Wallace, D. O'Dwyer, M. Doyle, Alderman P. O'Flynn.

The officials in attendance were—Messrs D. McNeice, Secretary; T. E. O'Sullivan, Engineer, and Captain C. Hanrahan, Harbour Master. With reference to the Bill prepared by the Minister for Industry and Commerce for the regulation of Harbour rates, replies were received from various Harbour authorities in the Free State on the question. The Secretary of the Cork Board stated that under the Cork Act, 1933, the Minister had power to fix and vary rates chargeable at the port. He added that his Board were favourable to the calling of a conference by the Dublin Port and Docks Board to consider the provisions of the Bill.

The Dublin Port and Docks Board Secretary wrote stating that the Bill had been referred to a small committee which would be prepared to collaborate with the representatives of the other ports if desired on the subject. The Sligo, Drogheda, and Waterford Boards wrote intimating that delegates had been appointed to attend the Conference to be called to consider the Bill by the Dublin Port and Docks Authority.

A letter was read on the same subject from Mr J. O. Power, Secretary, Limerick Chamber of Commerce, to the effect that the Executive Council of the Association of Chambers of Commerce had it under consideration. The feeling of the Council was that the powers taken by the Minister under the Bill were far too drastic, and its provisions should be considered by all the Harbour Boards in the Free State, to take whatever steps that may be thought necessary.

The Chairman said the Minister had an object in introducing the Bill. Mr O'Dwyer said none of the Harbour Boards appeared to be represented at the conference which the Minister had called at Government Buildings to consider the draft Bill. The Chairman—Quite so. Mr Stevenson suggested that the Board appoint delegates to attend the conference to be called by the Dublin Port and Docks Board.

The Chairman—Do you make that a proposition? Mr Stevenson—I do. Mr O'Dwyer seconded the proposition, which was passed. The following were appointed on the delegation—The Mayor, Messrs S. J. K. Roycroft, E. Stevenson, D. O'Dwyer, and T. J. Loughrey. The Secretary reported that eight regular traders, one coaster, and five overseas vessels arrived in port since last meeting.
