MILITARY INSPECTION

At Sarsfield Barracks.

Major-General Brennan, Chief of Staff, inspected the 9th Infantry Reserve Battalion at the Sarsfield Barracks, Limerick, to the conclusion of their annual course of training. The Battalion, which presented a smart appearance, paraded in the Barracks Square, Colonel Vize, O.C., being in command. With the Chief of Staff were Colonel McCabe, Cork; Commandant MacAllister, Cork; Commandant T. Colonel Saurin, and Captain Cannon. No. 2 Army Band was in attendance and rendered the music appropriate to the occasion. Major-General Brennan, having taken the salute, congratulated the troops and then presented medals to the winners of the rifle shooting competitions. There will be a ceremonial parade of the troops through the city next Sunday.

MUNICIPAL IMPROVEMENT WORKS.

With reference to a proposal of the Corporation to the effect that the Department be requested to allow the construction of the sewer at Corbally, at a cost of £20,000 to be carried out by direct labour, a letter was read at the Improvement Committee meeting last night from the Department stating that a contract should be tendered for on a competitive basis.

The Borough Surveyor said he had prepared an estimate for a sewer at the 1st Circular Road. It worked out at £20,000 and the Council should apply for a grant for the work. Up to the present the department has made for grants for sewers, roads and paths totalled £18,000.

The Committee decided to advertise tenders for the Corbally sewer, and to apply for a grant for a similar work at the 1st Circular Road.
