#### DEATH OF MISS E. M. CLELAND.

It is with regret we have to record the death which occurred at Bedford on last Monday of Miss Eleanor M. Cleland, only daughter of the late Mr Jas. Cleland, who was formerly well known in this city, and of Mrs Cleland, 2 Richmond Terrace. The death took place after an illness of about 4 years' duration—an illness which was bravely borne, and though for over 3 years separated in Switzerland from home and home friends, her cheerful spirit and high courage did not fail, and her interest was still with old associations at home. Miss Cleland was previously a member of the staff of the Limerick Steam Ship Co., where her bright and courteous nature won for her high esteem, while in private life she endeared herself to a large circle of friends, all of whom tender deepest sympathy to her mother in her grief, as also to her two brothers residing in Canada, who were unable to see their sister during her illness.

The remains arrived in Limerick on last Thursday morning by the 10 15 am train s large number of sympathising friends having gathered to meet Mrs Cleland, who travelled from Bedford with the remains, accompanied by her cousin, Miss R. Gubbins, sister of Lt. Col. W. Gough Gubbins and Lady Shaw. The coffin was covered with many beautiful wreaths and as the funeral passed down O'Connell street various shop blinds were drawn, and also those of the P.Y.M.A. The chief mourners were-Mrs Cleland (mother of the deceased) Lt.-Col. and Mrs W. G. Gubbins, and Miss R. Gubbins.

The interment took place in the family burial place at St. Mary's Cathedral, the Service in the Cathedral being conducted by the Ven. Archdescon J. T. Waller, assisted by the Very Rev. Dean Swain. "O, Rest in the Lord" was played by the Cathedral organist, Mr F. Muspratt, and the 23rd Psalm was sung, also the hymn "Let me be with Thee where Thou art." An address was delivered by the Archdeacon, in which many touching tributes were paid to the memory of the deceased. As the flower-strewn coffin was being carried down the aisle, the organ played, know that my Redeemer liveth." The Archdeacon read the committal sentences at the graveside.
