George Rickford, Clare street, sued Gera Hartney, Mulgrave street, for £1 6s. 8 due for the hire of a motor car

The plaintiff's case was that on the 15 July, 1931, he hired a car to defendant 30s. to go to Tuam. There was a balance 10s. due by defendant on foot of a previous transaction, and all that was paid v 13s. 4d., leaving 26s. 8d. due.
