FUNERAL OF MR. JAMES O'HALLORAN.

The remains of the late Mr James
O'Halloran, who was foreman compositor of
the "Limerick Chronicle" for thirty-seven
years, were interred this evening in Mount
St. Lawrence Cemetery. The funeral
cortege left St. Mary's Church at 3 o'clock,
and was of very large proportions. It was
representative of every interest in the city,
members of the Corporation, Harbour
Board, and Trades and Labour bodies
being in the procession. The Typographical
Society, of which the deceased was one of
the oldest members, was fully represented,
as was the "Chronicle," with which he was
connected from boyhood. It was a striking
tribute of respect to the memory of the
deceased, and showed the sympathy felt for
his family in their bereavement.
