PATRICKSWELL D. LICENCE.

At the Limerick Circuit before Judge McElligott, K.C., a decision was made by Mr G. C. Cullinan, C.J., on an application made by Mr G. C. Cullinan, C.J., on behalf of Thomas Reidy for a licence to hold a dance hall at Patrickswell.

Mr Cullinan said that his application for a licence at the last sitting was refused until the present sitting. He said that the hall had been held there admirably, there being no objection ever from the Garda authorities.

Mr L. O'B. Kelly (in support of T. O'B. Kelly solr.), said that the court Father McNamara, who had altered his opinion with regard to the licence for the dance hall, intended to grant the licence. Father McNamara would like to know what conditions would be imposed.

Rev Father McNamara said that the licence granted be the same as that applied to another such hall, that dancing would be held at 10 p.m. in winter, and 8 p.m. in summer. That no dances be held on Lent, and that a committee of parishioners be appointed to manage the hall.

His Lordship said that he was struck by the fact that the licence was the leave to hold the hall on the 20th and 29th of August.

Father McNamara—I am in favour of the licence. His Lordship—It also strikes me that a committee of parishioners and the applicant supervise the hall is unfavourable to the private owner of the premises. I will not grant this licence, but I will give permission to hold the all-night dance on the 20th and August.
