THE PROPOSED BUS STATIONS.

Trades and Labour Protest.

The question of the contemplated new I.O.C. bus stations in the city was considered at a meeting of the Trades and Labour Council, at which Mr Jas. McQuane, President, presided.

The following resolution was passed—
“That the Limerick Trades and Labour Council, representing thousands of the workers, protest against the proposal to fix new bus stations in the city as being a retrograde step, because in our opinion the present terminus in Sarsfield street is the most suitable and convenient for the citizens and the visiting public, and any change would be detrimental to the workers interests, particularly to the Distributive and allied trades, and to business generally.”

DEATH OF MR. D. FOLEY.

The death, which we regret to announce, took place at his residence, Ballinacurra, yesterday, of Mr Dermot (Fergus Finnbheil) Foley, after a brief illness.
