

**Education in County**

All schemes have been completed. Limerick will be amply provided with the matter of facilities for education. Yesterday, at the meeting of the Committee, it was decided that Mr. J. Smyth, manager, has completed the plans and the equipment of the new hospital and Newcastle West, and Messrs. Sheehan and Co. would be ready to be in a short time. It is proposed to provide further centres of education in the county by building schools at Croom, Shanagolden, and Kilfinane at an estimated cost of £3,000. A sum of £3,000 has been provided from the accumulated funds of the County Council, and the balance raised by the County Council. As to the possibility of providing further centres of education from the Government, the Committee are to be satisfied that the Department was prepared to pay half the interest payable on the loan, the Committee providing the balance. The Committee are to be satisfied on their progressive spirit in providing technical education, which has facilities at home for the rising generation it had in former days. In the county we have a fine Technical School, and owing to the increasing population it has had to extend its premises in the past few years, and the number of students is increasing year by year.

Ald. Reidy said he understood that the claims ranged from £50 to £500, and it would be a very serious matter if the amounts were to be levied on the rates.

The Mayor said that he did not know the provisions of the Act, and it was decided to refer the matter to the Law Agent for a report.

We regret to announce the death, which took place last Monday, of Brigadier-General Vesey Thomas Bunbury, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., at his residence, Red House, Hook, Hants, in his seventy-fifth year. He was the second son of the late Right Rev. Thomas Bunbury, D.D., Bishop of Limerick from 1899 to 1907. His earlier life was spent with the family in Limerick, and the news of his demise has been heard of with regret by many old friends. Brigadier-General Bunbury had a distinguished military career. He married, in 1904, the Hon. Daisy Carleton, daughter of Baroness Dorchester.
