DEATH OF MR. JOHN GRIFFIN

The death, which we regret to announce, took place to-day in St. John's Hospital of Mr John Griffin, Lower Gerald Griffin street, after an illness borne with patience and fortitude. The deceased, who was in middle life, was partner in the firm of Griffin and Sons, funeral undertakers, and youngest son of the late Mr John Griffin. He was one of the most popular figures in the city, and a man who took a deep interest in every movement calculated to enhance the welfare of the people, particularly the poor. In his early days Mr Griffin took a prominent part in outdoor pastimes, especially in Rugby football and rowing. He played for Garryowen on several seasons in club and Munster Cup fixtures, and was also selected to represent Munster in the inter-provincial engagements. He was a member of Athlunkard Boat Club practically since its foundation, and was a prominent oarsman. He rowed as junior and senior on several occasions, and held the position of captain of the Club, which he represented on the Irish Amateur Rowing Union. He was also a member of Munster Council on the I.A.R.U., a position he held up to the time of his demise.

A wide circle of friends will sympathise with his widow and children, as well as his brother, Mr Dan Griffin, in their bereavement.

The remains will be removed to St. John's Cathedral at 8 o'clock this evening, and the funeral will leave at 12 o'clock on Monday to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery, Requiem Mass being at 10.30 o'clock.
