Due to Scalding.

An inquest was held in John-street Civic Guard Barrack last evening by Mr J. S. McNeice, solicitor, Deputy Coroner, and a jury, into the circumstances connected with the death of William Browne, aged three years, in St. John's Hospital on Sunday night.

The evidence went to show that the deceased, only child of Mr John Browne, publican and cattle dealer, Parteen, accidentally struck against a pail of boiling water in the kitchen of his house, overturning it, with the result that he was extensively scalded about the body.

The medical testimony was that death was due to shock following extensive scalding.

A verdict of accidental death was returned.
