IRISH TRANSPORT AND GENERAL WORKERS' UNION.

At meetings of Tannery and Slipper Sections of above (Limerick) the following resolution was passed: "We call on the Government to make arrangements with the tanneries in the Free State to have the skins of the 400,000 sheep which it is proposed to slaughter in the year to come, and utilised for the Irish shoe industry, rather than export them to the benefit of the industry across the water."

The secretary was directed to send a copy of the resolution to the head of the Union, Minister for Industry and Commerce, Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries, Labour Party, Fianna Fail Party, and the Press.
