## INSURANCE STAMPS. PROSECUTION.

Three Polish citizens, Benjamin Turck, Edward Papielec, and Icek Jakob Najuack, were charged on remand at Burgt to-day with having in their possession nineteen thousand Health Insurance stamps.

# FUNERAL OF MEJ. C. CAPSEY.

The funeral of Mr John Charles Capsey, only son of Mr C. H Capsey, Locomotive Supt., G.S.R., Limerick, who died from injuries received last Good Friday evening, when he was motoring homewards, took place yesterday at 12 noon from Trinity Church. Regret and sympathy at the cutting off of a young and promising life are general in the city, and this was manifest yesterday when a very large and representative concourse accompanied the remains to their last resting place at St. Mary's Cathedral. The P.Y.M.A., of which the deceased was a very popular member, had its premises closed, and many business houses had their blinds drawn. An impressive feature was a number of young men from the Locomotive Works and the P.Y.M.A. who acted as pall-bearers and carried a number of beautiful wreaths of natural flowers sent by relatives and friends. Other wreaths were strewn on the coffin.

At 11.45 a.m. a Service, conducted by the Archdeacon of Limerick, was held in Trinity Church, which was filled with mourners, including many ladies.
