PROMINENT LIMERICK MAN DEAD.

Dr. John Myles.

We regret to record the death of Dr. John Myles, M.D., F.R.C.S.I., brother of Sir Thomas Myles, the eminent Dublin Surgeon, which took place on Wednesday at Frohenlog, Dolgally, North Wales, in the 79th year of his age. The deceased gentleman spent his earlier life in Australia, and returning to this country took up the study of medicine. He graduated M.B., B.Ch., in Dublin University in 1889, and five years later took the M.D. degree. He was elected a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons, and during the European War he served as Captain in the Royal Army Medical Corps. In recent years he had been residing in Wales. He took an active interest in the British Legion, and was awarded its gold badge. The funeral took place in Wales.

Dr Myles was a member of an old Limerick family, who more than sixty years ago were big corn merchants in this city. The deceased and his brother were prominent oarsmen in the seventies, with the late Messrs. Samuel E. Lee, R. J. Lee, and Pierce Power, and figured in many exciting contests on the Shannon and elsewhere, carrying off many championship cups and prizes. The late Dr John Myles, who, it may be remarked, rowed at Henley somewhere about that time, was a personal friend of Mr Michael Joyce, ex-M.P., who wired to Sir Thomas his sympathy on the death of his brother, and which he has just feelingly acknowledged.

BURNING ACCIDENT.

Fatal Termination.

The City Coroner, Mr J. S. McNeice, held an inquest at Barrington's Hospital on Thursday afternoon on Bridget Morrissey, aged 13 years, North Circular Road, who died in the institution that morning from injuries sustained on the 4th instant.

The evidence of the father, Michael Morrissey, showed that while he was absent from his home his daughter's clothing accidentally took fire. He extinguished the flames, and then had her removed to hospital.

Dr T. Morris, House Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, stated that the girl's body was severely burned and death was due to shock and toxic absorptions.

A verdict accordingly was recorded. The Coroner expressed sympathy with the father of the deceased, in which Sergeant McFall joined on behalf of the Garda.
