SUDDEN DEATH.

While working at the docks yesterday morning Christopher O'Sullivan, a carter, had a seizure with fatal results. It appears that the man when about to undertake his work was noticed to collapse. He was immediately attended by a priest and removed in the Fire Station ambulance to Barrington's Hospital, where he was dead on admission. He was 36 years of age, unmarried, and lived in Market Alley.

An inquest was held at Barrington's Hospital to-day by Mr J. S. McNeice, solr., Deputy Coroner.

Dr O'Mahony, temporary House Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, deposed to having made a post-mortem examination with Dr Dundon. They found no marks of external injury, and death in their opinion was due to rupture of the right auricle of the heart, accelerated by exertion.

Alphonsus O'Sullivan, a brother of the deceased, said the latter was 36 years of age, and had always been in perfect health, as he was on the morning of his demise.

The inquest was, on the application of Sergeant Morgan, adjourned to 6 o'clock this evening for the attendance of a witness.
