

## Distinguished Medical Officer on Tour of Inspection.

Dr. Melville Mackenzie, medical officer of the health section of the League of Nations, Geneva, who is at present in Ireland on an official invitation from the Government, visited Cork yesterday.

In an interview, Dr. Mackenzie said that the purpose of his visit was to study local conditions in the Irish hospitals with a view to suggesting what countries in Europe would it be useful for members of the Local Government Department and Hospitals Commission to visit during the autumn.

Dr. Mackenzie has already studied hospitals in different parts of the world, particularly those of Europe. He visited Limerick on Saturday. He was accompanied by Mr. Doran (Chairman of the Irish Hospitals Commission), Dr. Madden, and Mr. E. Kelly, and visited St. John's Hospital and the County Infirmary.
