## LORRY CRASHES INTO A TREE

### Judge McElligott's Condemnation.

At Limerick Circuit Court,  
 John A. Dooley, Birr, claimed £348 19s.  
 3d. in respect of damages sustained by  
 reason of a lorry and trailer crashing into a  
 tree placed across the road between Croom  
 and Charleville on the 21st August last.

The evidence went to show that the trailer  
 contained furniture, some of which was  
 damaged, as well as the lorry, which was  
 seriously damaged.

Giving a decree for £205 14s 6d. with ten  
 guineas expenses, the Judge said the claim  
 was due to blackguardism, which was ruining  
 the country. The cutting of trees was a  
 most scandalous and criminal act; but he  
 would have to try and protect the ratepayers  
 in endeavouring to arrive at a conclusion  
 between the experts regarding the damage  
 done.
