A resolution was then passed, on the motion of Mr A. Mackey, seconded by Mr J. McAuley, viewing with apprehension the Shannon Fisheries Bill, which threatened to sweep away the existence of any right created or acquired in any part of the Shannon area, without enquiring into an industry of such vast importance. The resolution appealed with confidence to the President of the Executive Council to withdraw the Bill and to direct that an independent public enquiry be held into the causes that are tending towards the extinction of the fisheries, which were, prior to the hydro-electric scheme, a valuable national asset.
