Cheltenham, of Miss Barbara Bunbury,  
youngest daughter of the late Right Rev.

### FIRE IN THE CITY.

A fire was discovered to have broken out  
at 1.25 o'clock this morning in a stable at  
Denmark street, the property of Messrs J.  
and G. Boyd, William street. A couple of  
horses were rescued by the caretaker, Mr  
Curtin, who is living nearby, and the  
Corporation Fire Brigade, under command  
of Captain Hogan, had the fire under  
control after some time. Damage was  
comparatively slight, and was confined to  
the loft of the stable, which had a galvanised
