

Two Results.

Bourke and Reidy Elected.

The first count concluded at 10.30, and as a result Ald. D. Bourke (1,271 votes) and Ald. J. Reidy (1,271 votes) were declared elected. Mr. P. T. Bourke having received the largest number of votes is now deemed to be the Mayor. The total number of votes cast is 12,608. The number of valid votes was 10,171, spoiled 177, and blank 636.

DEATH OF MR R. F. LYNCH.

We regret to record the death, which occurred in St. John's Hospital yesterday, of Mr Richard F. Lynch, Newenham street, after a few days illness. The deceased, who was 64 years of age, retired from the Postal Telegraph Service only quite recently on pension, having occupied the position of Assistant Supt. for a number of years. He was a courteous and efficient public servant, and was held in the highest respect by the public and his colleagues in the Post Office. In his early days he played Rugby football for Garryowen as out half-back, and figured in every engagement of importance with the club. He frequently played inter-provincial trials, and down to the time of his death he was a keen follower of the code. His death has been learned with keen regret in his native city, and the sympathy of the public will be given to his relatives in their bereavement.
